Scrap Metal – Please don't leave scrap metal out. We have had several incidents of vehicles entering the estate looking for scrap metal and we have had incidents of people entering drives and gardens uninvited. Anyone collecting scrap metal from others needs a license. If you do wish to sell scrap metal to someone in the street, ask to see their licence and be aware It is an offence for a scrap metal dealer to purchase scrap metal for cash. The dealer must pay by cheque or by electronic transfer. The dealer is required to record the method of payment and keep a copy of any cheque or any receipt identifying the transaction. The best way to ensure you're selling your scrap in an above-board and responsible fashion, and for the best price, is to find a reputable, licensed scrap yard.



Suspicious vehicles - The vast majority of people or vehicles reported as 'acting suspiciously' are entirely innocent. However, it is important that you report your suspicions to the police so that they can check. Serious crimes have been prevented due to the vigilance of the public. Suspicious behaviour can be hard to define. Generally, if any behaviour gives rise to your concerns, the Police would like to hear about it on 101 or SandhurstNHPT@thamesvalley.pnn.police.uk. You can help them to carry out their enquiries by providing the basis for your suspicions, however do not put yourself at any risk to obtain information. If possible please note down:

- What are they doing?
- A good description of the person(s). What clothing are they wearing? Are they carrying anything?
- The Registration, make/model and colour of any vehicle involved.
- The direction of travel of any person or vehicle. Where are they going?
